nies at Arwine Cemetery in Hurst," Kelley said. "We had maybe 30 to 40 people attending and it was a simple ceremony, but it steadily started to increase."

"We just had to find another cemetery or pack into a very small one," he said. "We looked around and we decided on Bluebonnet."

At about the time the American Legion was finding a new cemetery, the VFW group was holding its own ceremonies at Arwine Cemetery. But within a few years, that organization also decided to move the services.

In 1972, VFW Post 4695 and American Legion Post 379 joined forces to sponsor the Memorial Day services, a tradition they has continued for 10 years.

The local veterans organizations not only moved the one-day service, but members began the practice of placing small American flags on graves of veterans.

"It was another way of honoring the veteran," Kelley said. "It

worked out well in the beginning because we placed the flags ourselves a few days before Memorial Day."

"But the number of veterans in the cemetery has easily tripled since we first started," he said. "That created quite a job."

To place an American flag on all the veteran graves at Bluebonnet, officials said it takes about three days. Generally, the flags are flying about a week before Memorial Day.

Kelley said the job became too great for the groups to handle. But Jim Flippin, general manager of Bluebonnet, said cemetery employees recently have helped the H-E-B veterans' groups place the flags.

"We've even added an avenue of flags which we place at the entrances to the cemetery," Flippin said. "That means we have an additional 150 to 175 flags to the list."

Since the start of the services, veteran officials said the crowds have steadily increased. Two of the big-

gest attendances occurred in 1976 and 1980.

Because it was the Bicentennial year, the 1976 Memorial Day service drew more than 500 people. Also, the veterans groups unveiled a granite memorial dedicated to the men and women of Tarrant County who had served their country.

The largest crowd, however, appeared in 1980 when Anderson, making a bid for the presidency, stopped in Colleyville for a Memorial Day speech. Officials say more than 800 people packed into the Colleyville cemetery.

"That was just a bit more than we expected," Chancellor said. "There were so many Secret Service agents that you couldn't help but bump into one."

Still, the Bluebonnet services in the latter part of May have existed year after year with only a slight change here and there.

"I don't see any reason why we can't keep the tradition going," Chancellor said.

Ceremonies begin at 10 a.m. Monday. The principal speaker for Monday's service will be Forest Watson, superintendent of H-E-B schools. In addition, the Memorial Day program includes the Grapevine High School band, soloist Oris Baldwin of the Arlington Heights United Methodist Church in Fort Worth and a squad from Carswell Air Force Base.

DEATH BRINGS WARNING ON UNRIPE NUTS

Funeral Today for Child
Who Died at Hurst After
Eating Green Pecans.

Death at Hurst yesterday morning of a 3-year-old child followed a sudden illness diagnosed as acute indigestion caused by the eating of green pecans. The tragedy brought a warning to parents from Dr. L. F. Rhodes, county health physician.

The child was Elbert E. Souder, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Souder. The little boy, with his 7-year-old brother, Roger, ate some pecans late Monday night. At 3 o'clock yesterday morning, he awoke, screaming with pain.

Dr. Rhodes, for many years the Souder family physician at Hurst, was called from Fort Worth. When he reached the home, the child was in convulsions. At 7 o'clock the child died.

Monday afternoon the little boy played around his mother's knee in Arwine Cemetery near Hurst, while she listened to funeral services for "Grandma" Henderson, an old friend. This afternoon, there will be a new grave in Arwine Cemetery, the grave of Elbert.

Funeral services will be held at 4 o'clock at Hurst Baptist Church. Rev. Elmer Lake, pastor of the church, assisted by Rev. J. W. Reddy and Rev. V. Arnold, will officiate.

Other survivors are his grandfather, E. E. Souder, and grandmother, Mrs. U. S. Anderson.

Dr. Rhodes warned parents last night that green pecans, particularly when eaten by children, cause acute indigestion. The child's death is the first fatality ever to come to his attention, but numerous cases of severe illness are caused every Fall by green pecans, he said.

Children are particularly apt to suffer from eating the unripe nuts because they are not careful enough in separating the meat from the inner hull, Dr. Rhodes explained. They frequently eat almost as much hull as pecan meat and that is believed to have been the case with the child at Hurst.

Union Dead Paid Tribute at Service

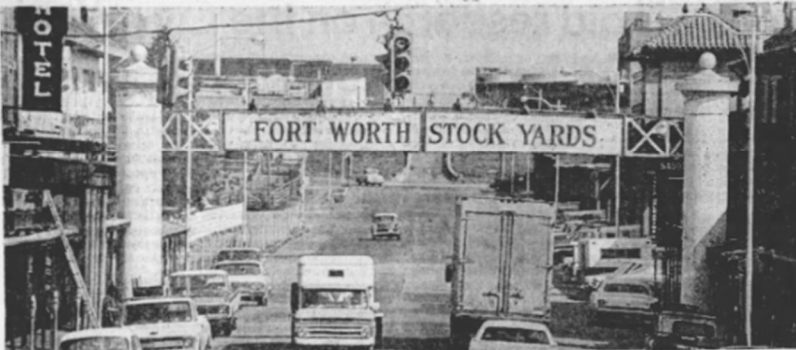

Songs, including "The End of the Road," were sung by Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Hooper and their sons, Wayne and Elmer. A volley was fired over the graves by a squad under the command of Capt. J. V. Russell of Troop A, One Hundred and Twenty-fourth Cavalry, and taps was sounded by J. V. Russell Jr.

Flowers were placed on each grave. The program, sponsored by the Daughters of Union Veterans, was arranged by Mrs. Hattie Faulkner, patriotic instructor of the Fort Worth chapter.

Stockyards have a sign of the (old) times

So many signs grace our landscape that one must pretend they are not there and look past them to see anything else.

However, a sign suspended over a street from two huge concrete columns is difficult to ignore.

The 36-foot-by-4-foot sign across East Exchange Avenue that proclaims "Fort Worth Stock Yards" to one and all is just such an imposing structure.

Many people do not realize that the sign itself shares the historic heritage of the district it heralds.

In fact, the sign has become the second North Fort Worth structure to be declared a landmark by the Texas Antiquities Committee (the other is Cowtown Coliseum).

"It is the sign amazes people that it is so old and that it is still standing," said Sue McCafferty, president of the North Fort Worth Historical Society. "A lot of them think it was done because now this is a tourist attraction."

"The sign itself is probably the most photographed thing down here because everybody gets under the sign. It and the Exchange Building."

The white sign with big black letter stretches across the 100 block of East Exchange, right in the heart of the Fort Worth Stockyards National Historic District.

The sign, its concrete columns,

and the Exchange Avenue concrete bridge over Marine Creek were built in 1910 by the Topeka Bridge & Land Co. for the Fort Worth Stock Yards Co.

The property then was owned by the Fort Worth Stock Yards Co., which in 1902 built the Livestock Exchange Building, new cattle pens and related livestock buildings. The company built the coliseum in 1906. Earlier, the property was part of a tract of land granted to Isaac Thomas (1813-1855) by Texas in 1850.

The sign's two columns erected on the west end of the bridge stand 16 feet above the street pavement. The columns are solid concrete, measuring 13 feet in circumference. They stand 46 feet apart. The columns have cut stone caps, between which runs latticework with electric lighting illuminating the sign.

The Stock Yards Co. directors approved \$16,000 for construction of the bridge and sign.

The construction was to be completed before the grand opening of the Feeders & Breeders Show (forerunner of the Stock Show) on March 14, 1910. W. B. King, then manager of the Stock Yards Co., said, "Come flood, come fire, a safe and secure passageway would be provided for

the public to attend the show." King intended that the sign represent a more modern entrance to the Stockyards.

The construction company employed more than 100 men to work both day and night shifts on the bridge project. It was the largest concrete job undertaken in Fort Worth up until that time.

The bridge and sign took on added significance in 1911 when the little town of Niles City was incorporated. The sign marked the western entrance of the "richest little city in the world."

Last year the sign received a \$6,000 refurbishment from the North Fort Worth Business Association,

using proceeds from the Pioneer Days celebration. Part of the refurbishing was making the previously unlettered east side of the sign identical to the west side.

The business association will pay to have state historical markers placed on each of the columns. The historical society researched the marker application (McCafferty and Janie Reid) and plans to dedicate the markers as part of its special Texas Sesquicentennial project to dedicate one marker each month during 1986.

A walk or a ride under the sign, any day of the week, any time of the year, will find tourists and locals exploring the largely unpolished western atmosphere of the Stockyards. The recently renovated Stockyards Hotel, restaurants, gift and western wear shops, and the Stockyards themselves are prime attractions. Sunday afternoons are especially good times to wander to the Stockyards and across the wooden walk above the cattle pens because the pens are full of cattle for the Monday auction.

The Stockyards historic district is about three miles north of downtown Fort Worth via North Main Street. East and West Exchange avenues are the focal points.

County pragmatic with its approach to Reconstruction

(Eighth in a series.)

For the most part, Fort Worth citizens took the conditions of Reconstruction in stride, taking a common-sense approach to unenforceable federal directives and "making do" with what they had.

Food supplies were low until a bumper harvest in 1866, but hunting conditions around Fort Worth were reliable; many families subsisted on venison, wild fruit and greens.

Money was scarce, but circulated well, as old debts were paid at first chance; the same \$20 gold piece could change hands several times in a single day, wiping out old obligations and reaffirming the credit rating of an entire community.

Fort Worth's true economic recovery came with the cattle drives of the late 1860s and 1870s, which will be discussed in a forthcoming series. Generally, during the Reconstruction years the rural settlements around Fort Worth were busy getting on with the task of making Tarrant County a fit place in which to live.

In 1866, a Methodist church was organized in Grapevine, and in present Hurst Daniel Arwine arrived from Indiana in 1865 and settled on a farm near the present intersection of Brown Trail and Pipeline Road. Arwine was a public-spirited man who donated six acres of land for a school, church, and cemetery. The Arwine school, first called Red Sulphur Spring, was the first school in that area. Today the Arwine cemetery is a noted historical site, surrounded by suburban homes, apartment complexes, and a shopping center. Arwine was one of several civic-minded pioneers who sensed their responsibility to provide for the county's future.

Another early settler who would have a town named after him was William Letchworth Hurst, a Con-

federate veteran who survived the Union POW camp at Rock Island, Ill. In 1870 he brought his family from Tennessee, settling first near Grapevine, then moving to Bedford before finally settling on a farm and opening a store. Later, when the Rock Island railroad built across the farm, the train stop was named after Hurst.

In 1870 another Confederate veteran, Weldon Wiles Bobo from Bedford County, Tenn., arrived in Tarrant County and established a store located about halfway between Fort Worth and Grapevine. Bobo's store became a half-way station for travelers to rest. Bobo was authorized to operate a U.S. post office in his store, which he named Bedford, after his native county in Tennessee. Soon Bedford could boast of several stores, a grist mill and a cotton gin.

The old half-way house, long deserted, was razed in the 1970s. Bobo's wife, "Aunt Mary," had carried messages behind the Union lines for the Confederacy in the Civil War. In defiance she flew a red flag over the house on Abraham Lincoln's birthday each year until she died, typifying the strong will and independent character of many Tarrant County citizens in the years following the Civil War.

HURST HISTORY — A cemetery where many pioneer Hurst area residents are buried received a Texas Historical Commission marker during ceremonies Sunday.

It's the Arwine Cemetery in the 700 block of Pipeline Road in Hurst. Pioneer Daniel Arwine, who was a deputy U.S. marshal, donated six acres for a school, church and cemetery in 1879.

Arwine's home was at Brown Trail and Pipeline Road, where Hurst Christian Church now stands, said Janette Tingle, president of the Northeast Historical Society, which took steps to get the historical marker approved. The City of Hurst paid the \$250 fee for the marker.

For many years, a school building — which doubled as a church and community meeting facility — was adjacent to the hilltop cemetery, Mrs. Tingle said.

small, private graveyard off Pipeline Road and Arwine Court in Hurst near the borders of Euless and Bedford.

Board members will supply chicken and cold drinks for a potluck lunch. Participants are asked to bring food and flatware, plates and napkins, extra drinking water, and, if possible, card tables, officials said.

Volunteers, who will trim bushes and trees, rake leaves and tidy up the grounds, can also bring rakes, other garden tools and trash bags, officials said.

"Everyone who has anyone buried there or some interest in the Arwine Cemetery is invited to come. It's a general cleanup," said group treasurer Billie Doyle Cole, who has several relatives buried in the cemetery.

The picnic will be followed by a membership meeting, one of two that the group has each year. The association was formed about 27 years ago.

To counteract vandalism, group members have installed two locked gates and a fence. Members are working to secure new grave markers because many of the original inscribed sandrock ones are gone, Cole said.

The cemetery is mowed periodically, but the group does not provide regular grave care, officials said.

"It's strictly up to the families," Cole said. "A lot of families are totally wiped out, and so we have to take it up for them. There are families that don't have anyone left. And there are some that don't take an interest."

Only relatives of those buried in the cemetery can be interred there. Burials used to be free, but the association now collects \$100 for them, Cole said.

The group is working with a consultant to plat the cemetery land and to assign spaces to families, board member Wallace McCurry said.

"There have never been individual grave sites assigned to anyone. When someone needed to be buried out there, we found a place for them. That continued to get harder and harder to do," said McCurry, whose family was among the founders of Hurst. "Individual families got with him and told him what they felt they needed."

The cemetery is named for wagon train pioneer Daniel Arwine, the maternal grandfather of association President Mary Ruth Ellis, according to an April news report.

Patterson, 56, became interested in Civil War history when he was about 13 and his great-grandmother Leona Cavender died at age 92.

"We were cleaning out her stuff, going through her things, and I looked in her Bible and found her parents' birthdates," he said. "And I was struck at how long ago they were born."

"They were alive when the battle of the Alamo was fought," he added.

He talked to as many people as he could find who remembered his great-great-grandfather Harvey Sparger — the Sparger in Cheek-Sparger Road on the Bedford/Colleyville border — who served in a Georgia cavalry unit.

According to one story, he slept in the corner section of a fence because "there was less danger of him getting stepped on by a cow or horse," Patterson said.

In another story, he caught a bird in the bush and was so hungry, he ate it without cooking it.

"He said he got caught by the Yankees," Patterson said. "They didn't have anywhere to put him."

"They locked him in the outhouse."

Patterson, a retired history teacher, spent more than 40

years on the monument project, sifting through documents in libraries and court-houses.

Patterson wrote almost all of the soldiers' biographies for the monument's Web site.

Descendents of the soldiers paid for the first three stones, and Patterson chipped in the money for the other three.

Patterson works at Worthington Monument Company in Fort Worth because he was paying so much money for the stone work that he wanted to do it himself.

Family pride

Many other Tarrant County residents are pleased to see their ancestors' names immortalized.

Women recall pioneer families

Several women, who are related descendants of Northeast Tarrant County pioneer families, recently met for lunch in Fort Worth.

There were "about four or five families, including the **Arwines**, **Souders**, **Andersons** and **Robertsons**, that came by covered wagon to the Hurst area in 1865 from central Indiana," said **Hattie Belle Cribbs**, 83, great-granddaughter of pioneer **Daniel Arwine**.

"It was all farmland, and my great-grandpa Arwine had a farm of hundreds of acres," Hattie Cribbs said. "His property was near Brown Trail and Pipeline Road, east to about Central and I guess, south to the railroad. The acreage where Arwine Cemetery is in Hurst was given by my great-grandpa. Enough land was given for the purpose of a cemetery, a school and a church. I can remember playing in the deserted Arwine School and the community church building.

"We have all lived within the Fort Worth/Dallas area all our lives, even to the grandchildren," Cribbs said. "We get together at Easter and Christmas to learn

more about the whole family. We'd written a history book, and we discussed this at the luncheon and exchanged notes on the other descendants."

Those attending the luncheon included **Dorothy Kinnaird-Dodd**, **Mary Ruth Ellis** and Cribbs, all of North Richland Hills; Ellis' sister, **Georgia Duncan** of Richland Hills; Kinnaird-Dodd's sister, **Mary Lutes Kinnan** of Haltom City; and Fort Worth residents, **Elouise Wright** and her sister, **Frances Kauffman**, also **Gladys Lutes Jones**, and **Ruby Lee Hackney Piester**.

"The first U.S. marshal in this area was Great-Grandpa Daniel

Arwine," Cribbs said. "His log house was where the Hurst Christian Church is now at Brown Trail and Pipeline Road. He would bring prisoners to his home and keep them overnight. If the weather permitted, he chained them to a tree in his front yard. If the weather was bad, he would put them in the barn and keep them overnight and then take them to Fort Worth Jail. When my grandmother was a child, she helped drive nails in the wood to help build this jail."

Cribbs' grandfather, **Jim Anderson**, was in the original group from Indiana, and later married Arwine's daughter, **Hattie**, who was about eight years younger than Anderson and a child at the time of the migration to Texas.

Jim and Hattie Anderson had 10 children — eight girls and two boys. The mothers of Cribbs and Piester, also Ellis and her sister, Duncan, were sisters, making them first cousins. They are second cousins to the others attending the luncheon. They are descendants of Jim Anderson's sister, **Lizzie Anderson Lutes**.

Upkeep costs threaten Bedford Cemetery

BEDFORD — Evelyn Fitch George's roots cling deep in the Bedford soil of her childhood — and reach into the surrounding communities of Hurst and Euless.

George's family moved to the H-E-B area from Fort Worth in 1914 when she was 1 year old.

"I've lived in the area ever since," she said.

Because of her love for the area, the continuing care of the old Bedford Cemetery, on Bedford Road east of Central Drive, is dear to George, secretary/treasurer of the Bedford Cemetery Association. But rising costs of upkeep aren't being met by a modest trust fund.

George said the cost of mowing the cemetery has risen to \$150 per mowing. Two certificates of deposit the cemetery association owns, which total about \$8,000, don't pay enough interest each year to pay for mowing. The association doesn't want to start dipping into principal to meet such costs.

"Since '84, mowing costs have gone up each time, and it's taken up the surplus," she said. "We are down to rock bottom."

The last time it was mowed, George contributed \$100, and she received \$300 from a cousin, Lynn Cannon, whose mother, Bedford pioneer Dona Cannon, is buried in the cemetery.

"We have enough to mow it two more times," she said. "And it needs mowing right now."

Through the years, George personally knew lots of people now buried in the Bedford Cemetery — plus the names of others who pioneered the Hurst-Euless-Bedford area from the time it was rolling farmland.

William L. Hurst, for whom Hurst was named, is there.

"Uncle Billy (William Hurst) always wanted to be buried in the 'Confederate Cemetery' — not with the Yankees at the Arwine Cemetery on Pipeline Road (in Hurst)," she said, laughing.

She said the oldest marked grave is of Elizabeth White Bobo, who died in 1871, but there are other unmarked graves from the 1860s.

"There are soldiers from both sides of the Civil War, the Spanish

American War and both World Wars," she said.

She named other families she remembered: "The Moore Family — one of the founders of Bedford.

"It was W.W. Bobo's home. He named it (Bedford) after Bedford County, Tennessee. The Fitches, Browns, Valentines, the Cannons, Hammonds, the Scotts — they were all involved in the town.

George's parents, Elijah and Mae Souder Wilkerson, farmed in the vicinity, establishing a 50-acre homeplace in 1925 on Central Drive, where they operated a dairy and truck farm and raised feed for their cows. Elijah Wilkerson, also a plumber, soon leased 100 acres of land near Pipeline Road in Euless for \$100 a year.

George attended the old Hurst Elementary and then the Bedford School beginning in the seventh grade. She married a Bedford man, Walter R. Fitch, who became the town's first postmaster in 1950. He also was the first town clerk after the city incorporated in 1953.

She and Walter Fitch established their home on Bedford Road 50 years ago — the same homesite she lives on today, although in a newer house. Together they operated Fitch's General Merchandise on Bedford Road from 1933 until they leased it out in 1963. Today it houses a doctor's office. After Walter Fitch's death in 1972, George married a childhood acquaintance, Woodrow George, who died in 1983.

Northeast Tarrant County after the Civil War.

Among the first was William Letchworth Hurst, a Confederate Civil War veteran who after two years as a prisoner of war, moved his wife and seven children from Ten-

nessee. They settled at first in Euless and then moved to Bedford in 1870. He farmed land there until moving to what is now Hurst in the late 1890s.

In 1903, the Rock Island Railroad wanted to build a rail line across his land, and he gave them a right of way. In exchange, the railroad built a train depot, naming it Hurst Station.

Although many believe

that's when the community was first named Hurst, George Green, a professor and historian who wrote *Hurst-Euless-Bedford, Heart of the Metroplex*, said it didn't take the name Hurst until six years later. A town 100 miles to the south in Coryell County was named Hurst until 1909, when it lost its post office.

Green said Saturday that

Hurst was the town's favorite entertainer. He played the fiddle at social events. Before one event, he told the residents he'd play "even if I they have to bring me in a coffin." Hurst died in his sleep the night before, Green said.

Hurst was buried in Bedford Cemetery, rather than Arwine Cemetery in Hurst. Bill Souder said Hurst was a Southern Democrat, while in-

law T. Jefferson Souder was from Indiana and a Republican. Souder was buried in the Hurst cemetery.

"He never liked Souder and even though his daughter married a Souder, he said, 'I don't want to be buried with all them Yankees.'"

In 1910, Hurst's population was about 20 within its business district and 200 including the farming community. Today,

Hurst has about 36,000 residents.

Even though it welcomes growth, Lana Davis, 55, great-granddaughter of Hurst, said the city's rich heritage makes it special. Many of the founding families' descendants still live in the community.

"Hurst is progressive, but it's still a small town where everybody knows everybody," she said.

Women recall pioneer families at luncheon

Several women, who are related descendants of Northeast pioneer families, recently met for lunch in Fort Worth.

There were "about four or five families, including the **Arwines**, **Souders**, **Andersons** and **Robersons**, that came by covered wagon to the Hurst area in 1865 from central Indiana," said **Hattie Belle Cribbs**, 83, great-granddaughter of pioneer **Daniel Arwine**.

"It was all farmland, and my great-grandpa Arwine had a farm of hundreds of acres," Hattie Cribbs said. "His property was near Brown Trail and Pipeline Road, east to about Central [Drive] and, I guess, south to the railroad. The acreage where Arwine Cemetery is in Hurst was given by my great-grandpa. Enough land was given for the purpose of a cemetery, a school and a church. I can remember playing in the deserted Arwine School and the community church building.

"We have all lived within the Fort Worth/Dallas area all our lives, even to the grandchildren," Cribbs said. "We get together at Easter and Christmas to learn more about the whole family. We'd written a history book, and we discussed this at the luncheon and exchanged notes on the other descendants."

bad, he would put them in the barn and keep them overnight and then take them to Fort Worth Jail. When my grandmother was a child, she helped drive nails in the wood to help build this jail."

Cribbs' grandfather, **Jim Anderson**, was in the original group from Indiana, and later married Arwine's daughter, **Hattie**, who was about eight years younger than Anderson and a child at the time of the migration to Texas.

Jim and Hattie Anderson had 10 children — eight girls and two boys. The mothers of Cribbs and Piester, also Ellis and her sister, Duncan, were sisters, making them first cousins. They are second cousins to the others attending the luncheon. They are descendants of Jim Anderson's sister, **Lizzie Anderson Lutes**.

Jim Anderson brought gold bars from Indiana to pay for about 2,000 acres of land in Tarrant County, much of it in the Hurst area, but some in Watauga, Euless and the Riverside area of northeast Fort Worth.

He and his wife later divided the land twice between their 10 children, Cribbs said. The first division they gave 50 acres to the ones who had a house on the land, and 75 to the others.

"My mother, **Bertha Anderson Reeves**, married **Linnie Pryor Reeves** in 1914, and I was born May 8, 1915, on the first 50 acres that Grandpa gave Mother," Cribbs said. "It was near Mosier Valley, in southeast Hurst.

"The second division I was old enough to remember. We all came to Grandma's and Grandpa's house in Hurst where the land was given for a courthouse on Bedford-Euless Road, the first sub-courthouse of the

Those attending the luncheon included **Dorothy Kinnaird-Dodd**, **Mary Ruth Ellis** and **Cribbs**, all of North Richland Hills; Ellis' sister, **Georgia Duncan** of Richland Hills; Kinnaird-Dodd's sister, **Mary Lutes Kinman** of Haltom City; and Fort Worth residents, **Elouise Wright** and her sister, **Frances Kauffman**, also **Gladys Lutes Jones**, and **Ruby Lee Hackney Piester**.

"The first U.S. marshal in this area was Great-Grandpa Daniel Arwine," Cribbs said. "His log house was where the Hurst Christian Church is now at Brown Trail and Pipeline Road. He would bring prisoners to his home and keep them overnight. If the weather permitted, he chained them to a tree in his front yard. If the weather was

"Grandpa's lawyer came out, and the children drew for the deeds for the property. This time, Mother got 50 acres over on Pipeline Road where all the houses have been torn down [to enlarge North East Mall]. That was my acreage, because Mother gave it to me. We ran cattle on that property for a long while. I sold it to Browning Construction Co."

Jim Anderson's sister, **Lizzie Anderson Lutes**, and her husband, **John Lutes**, who were grandparents of the other first cousins at the luncheon, "settled mostly in the Riverside area," Kinnaird-Dodd said. "They had five children, including a set of twins. They had about six rent houses near Sylvania Avenue."

War Between the States.

Mayor William D. Tate, who has parents, grandparents and siblings buried in Grapevine Cemetery, paid tribute to the women "buried in our community who endured the hardships of the Civil War."

He paid homage to their courage, determination, sacrifice and suffering, as well as their ability to adapt to a changing situation and learn new responsibilities.

"We honor all of the women of that terrible war," the mayor said. "Those who had to take over and run family businesses and family farms. Those who had to milk the cows, plow the fields and reap the harvest. Those who had to become nurses

and administer to wounded soldiers. Those who had to knit the socks, sweaters and coats and weave the blankets for the troops. All of those who assumed these new roles while at the same time raising kids, educating them and seeing that they were clothed and fed."

Flags mark the graves
Their graves were marked with appropriate flags showing the number of family members they had in the conflict and their allegiances. At the conclusion of the ceremony, muskets were fired to honor the women.

"Researchers have confirmed that 53 men buried in Grapevine Cemetery were Confederate soldiers," Patterson said. "Two additional Confederates have memorial stones or cenotaphs there but their bodies were buried on battlefields where they fell in Georgia. Ten Union veterans who came

to this community after the War are also buried in Grapevine Cemetery."

Patterson said his research has shown that every other pioneer cemetery in Northeast Tarrant County, except one, contains the grave of at least one Confederate soldier, and many of them have dozens. Hurst's Arwine Cemetery has several Civil War veterans, but every single one of them was a Union soldier.

The Arwines were staunch Union men who came to the Grapevine area a few years after the war.

"Even Colleyville's Bluebonnet Hills, which wasn't established until all the vets were gone, has one Confederate soldier," Patterson said. "When Dallas/Fort Worth Airport was built decades ago, they moved one family cemetery to make way for construction. Confederate Jack Estill, who died in 1900, was buried there in

the Lipscomb Cemetery, and his family opted to move his body to Bluebonnet near where they lived at that time. Many of the others, including at least one Confederate veteran, were moved to Grapevine Cemetery."

Patterson said Sons of Confederate Veterans members discovered during research for the project that "three of the ladies were lying in unmarked graves."

"With the cooperation of family members, those ladies received new granite headstones in short order," Patterson said.

Brochure planned

He said the 20 women honored in Saturday's ceremony will be further highlighted soon in a detailed brochure that will be produced with photographs of the women and their soldier sons, headstones, documents and other interesting information. It will be made avail-

able online. To receive a pdf copy of the brochure via email, contact Mike Patterson at mfpchat@yahoo.com to get on the list.

Patterson said his efforts at Grapevine Cemetery are one way of paying homage to his family's longtime tenure in the area. Kin have been living in what is now Colleyville for eight generations, the last seven of them where he lives now on Glade Road.

He attended the old Pleasant Run School in Colleyville and graduated from Grapevine High School in 1970. He drove a truck and forklift for several years before becoming a teacher in the Birdville school district for nearly two decades.

"I taught Texas history mostly," Patterson said.

Patterson marked his first Confederate grave in 1964 with a stone he got from the Veterans Administration. He was too young

to drive, so his grandfather loaded the stone and Mike into his pickup and they installed it in Bear Creek Cemetery in Euless.

Patterson's great-great grandfather was Corp. Harvey R. Sparger (1833-1914), of Co. K, 12th Georgia Cavalry, a Confederate veteran who came to this community in the fall of 1879. His home farm is now occupied by the Tara Plantation development in Colleyville. Patterson's home is about one mile away.

"One of my great-grandmothers lived with us until she died in 1965," Patterson said. "Her father, Harvey Sparger, was a Confederate soldier and we talked about him nearly every day."

"Many of the people who came to visit in our home were children or grandchildren of Civil War soldiers, too. They were interesting old folks, and that's where I got my love of genealogy and history."

87, who was born in Hurst and is the only living grandson of Daniel Arwine.

"I just saw everybody — first and second cousins and probably third," John Arwine said. "I've never seen the like. It was a wonderful deal."

His father, **Enoch**, was the ninth of 10 children born to Daniel and Julia Arwine, who moved from Indiana with five children in 1865 in covered wagons with other pioneer families. "The other five were born in Texas," he said.

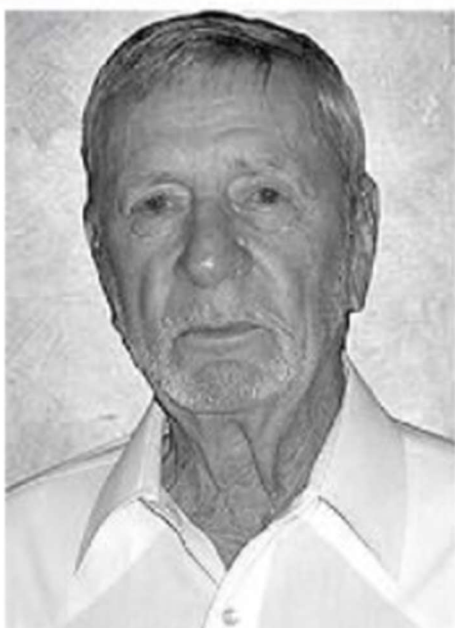

Former Bedford Mayor U.Z. "Easy" Jernigan, who helped bring home-rule government to the city during the late 1960s, died Monday of a heart attack at his home in Osceola in Hill County. He was 70.

Funeral will be at 4 p.m. Thursday at Lucas Funeral Home in Hurst. Burial will be in Arwine Cemetery in Hurst.

Jernigan, who got his nickname because of his easy-going personality and the initials of his first and middle name, conducted council meetings with a gavel on an apple box in the city's first City Hall, which has since been converted to a fire station, said his son, Dan Jernigan of Fort Worth.

He served as the city's first municipal court judge and was one of its first firefighters. Associates credited Jernigan with bringing harmony to a politically troubled Bedford City Hall after he was elected mayor in 1962.

Jernigan was owner of Easy Jernigan's Auto Upholstery in downtown Fort Worth, which did contract work for Bell Helicopter Textron.

As mayor, he was instrumental in hiring Bedford's first city manager, Bob Levins, and its first police chief, J. B. Wallace, after it became a home rule city with a city charter.

Legion Post 379 proud of size, wide-ranging service projects

American Legion Post 379 was founded in 1964 by 15 men and its membership has soared to the second-largest in the state.

Veterans Joe Sevier, O.L. Carrothers, Bill Lucas and Joe Jones were among those founders. Carrothers was the first commander.

Jim Early, public information director, said the post has 760 members, making it the largest of the 19 posts in Tarrant County. And as the post has grown, so has its list of service projects.

"People think of the American Legion post as a bunch of men sitting around playing dominoes," Early said. "It's much more than that."

One of their projects is 40/8, an honorary branch of the post. Regular members are invited to join the honorary branch, which raises money to sponsor nursing training, Early said.

The branch takes its name from the railroad boxcars used in World War I to transport troops and horses. "Back in the war," Early said, "a boxcar could hold 40 men or eight horses. That is the basis of the name."

Jones said he remembers how the early members struggled to keep the post going. Membership was low, making it difficult for the post to raise money to help veterans and their families.

Jones, who has been post commander four times, said he loaned the post \$1,000 to lease the original headquarters on what is now Texas 10. But as membership and funding

increased, the post was able to build a new home at 1245 N. Industrial Blvd. It was dedicated in November 1983 with 280 members.

"When you walked into that other place, we didn't have much to offer," Jones said. "It was small. But the bigger hall allows us to have bingo and dances so we can raise more funds."

San Antonio is the only Texas post larger than Post 379 in Northeast Tarrant County. San Antonio has 1,000 members. Jones said Post 379's membership has doubled in the past two years, and he is confident it will surpass San Antonio within a few years.

"If we continue to go on like this, we'll be the biggest in the state," he said. "We'll just keep on plugging along."

Raising funds is an important part of the post's activities. Those increased when the post filed for a permanent charter in 1966 and with its first all-out membership drive in 1967.

With the additional funds, the post has been able to help more veterans and other people in the community.

"We support non-veterans at times," Jones said. "We like to help as many people as possible."

One of its annual projects is Boys State, a youth camp in Austin that teaches civics, "Americanism and patriotism," current commander Bill Lucas said. Two boys are selected each year by high schools in the Hurst-Euless-Bedford school district, and the post pays \$500 each to

cover camp expenses.

This year, the two were chosen from Trinity and Bell high schools. Juniors are selected so they can return to school and share what they learned at Boys State, Lucas said.

"We've had very good students come out of here," Jones said.

A ladies auxiliary to the post also sends two high school girls to the same camp. An awards banquet is scheduled for June 31, and some of the youths will advance to national competition in Annapolis, Md.

The post also donates supplies to needy families at Thanksgiving and toys at Christmas. Every month, \$100 is donated by the post to the H-E-B school district "for disadvantaged children," Early said. "It's a fund left up to the school for children who have problems, such as needing eyeglasses."

On Memorial Day, the post conducts traditional services at Bluebonnet Hills cemetery. The crowds became so large when the services were started at Arwine Cemetery that they were moved to Bluebonnet. In 1971, a fund was established in conjunction with Post 4695 to build Veterans Memorial at the cemetery to honor all veterans of wars.

The post is affiliated with the 12th District of the American Legion, which includes all posts in and around Fort Worth, which includes 19 Tarrant County posts.

Jones is vice commander of that district. Some Legion members also belong to Veterans of Foreign Wars, whose members have served overseas.

Veterans who are not members and would like to join the American Legion may call the post at 267-6047.

"At Arwine, we had one teacher and about 50 scholars. Bright ones, too.

"By the time I was 16 I had learned as high as you could go -- clear into the eighth grade. It was just the right amount, because when I got married I stayed married. None of this gay divorcee stuff.

"When books took up, we spelled louder than a hive of bumblebees."

"At First Recess," she continued, "we lined up on the hillside and 'Popped The Whip' snappier than any mule skinner. So many of the end kids slid into the cactus patch that we spent half of every elocution class picking out the stickers.

"Arwine Cemetery was right next by. And at noon we sat in the sunshine and ate dinner. Ghosts didn't bother us. We swapped sausages and jelly bread, and took care not to turn over the cup of syrup in the bottom of our lunch bucket."

"...Cleaned our hands by pulling down saplings. Three or four of us would worry a young post oak down to the ground. Then put a kid astraddle of it. . . And let him go. When he got back to school was his business."

"There was a deep draw by the playground. The Sheep lined up on one bank. And the Wolf got in the bottom of the ditch. When he yelled, 'Wolf Over The River,' you never saw such scattering and head knocking, and knee skinning as took place.

"Then for the sissies and on rainy days when the ditch was muddy, we played Annie Over The School House.

"It's like I said to begin with. Every school needs a graveyard, a ravine, and some young post oaks."

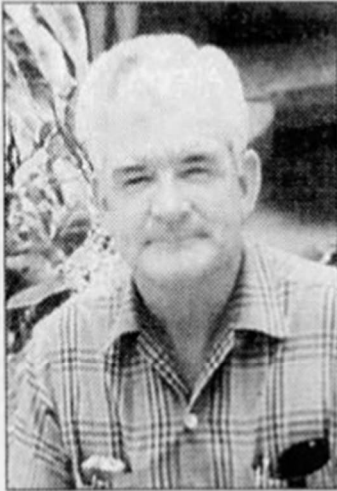

10 WAR FRIENDS TO BE HONORED

In 1865, when swords had been sheathed and Northern and Confederate forces left bivouac for fireside, eight young Indiana soldiers and two nurses, all related by blood or marriage, set out to make their homes in Texas. Fortune led them to sites near Birdville, Bedford and Hurst, and so strong was their affection that they made a pledge never to be separated, not even in death.

The bodies of the 10 are buried in Arwine Cemetery, near Hurst, and Sunday at 3 p. m. Fort Worth members of the Daughters of Union Veterans will hold a memorial service at the plot in honor of James Arwine, donor of the land on which the cemetery was founded, and his wartime comrades.

The program, announced yesterday by Mrs. Hattie Faulkner, 416 Jennings Avenue, patriotic instructor of the chapter here, includes addresses by District Judge Lattimore and Mrs. Vivian Palmer of Fort Worth, president of the Texas department of the organization.

National Guardsmen will fire a volley over the graves and taps will be sounded by J. V. Russell. Singing will be led by the T. J. Hooper family.

Mrs. Sarah Robertson, who served as a nurse in the Union Army during the Civil War, was the last to die. She was buried three years ago. Arwine died more than 50 years ago, Mrs. Faulkner recalled. Others whose graves are located in the cemetery are Daniel Arwine, brother of James Arwine; Jefferson Souder and his wife, Mary Ellen Souder, who was a war nurse; James D. George, father of J. M. City honors namesake on its 50th anniversary

SALUTE TO HURST

HURST — The city honored its heritage and saluted its future generations as it marked its 50th birthday Saturday, with the unveiling of a sculpture of its founder.

Mayor Bill Souder and sculptor Larry Crowder unveiled the life-size bust of William Letchworth Hurst before a crowd of about 200 people at City Hall. A time capsule filled with mementos of Hurst in 2002 was sealed inside the sculpture's masonry pedestal as a gift to Hurst's residents in 2052.

"This is a milestone for Hurst," said Souder, 80, who is William Letchworth Hurst's great-grandson. "The future of Hurst as well as its past is shaped by its citizens."

Crowder, who was commissioned by Souder to create the 28-inch high, 70-pound bust, said he was honored to unveil his work in the city he calls home.

"We're not only celebrating the quality of life we have today, but sending a message to future citizens that we consider our heritage to be important, and we consider the arts to be important," Crowder said.

The time capsule holds about 50 items, including minutes from a recent City Council meeting,

recent editions of area newspapers such as the *Star-Telegram*, a book that tells the story of Bell Helicopter Textron, Hurst police and firefighter patches, the 50th anniversary proclamation, the 2002 L.D. Bell High School yearbook, letters from fourth-graders at Bellaire Elementary School and a scroll signed by people at Saturday's ceremony.

Hurst was incorporated on Sept. 25, 1952, but its history dates back to the late 1800s when settlers began arriving in Northeast Tarrant County after the Civil War.

Among the first was William Letchworth Hurst, a Confederate Civil War veteran who after two years as a prisoner of war, moved his wife and seven children from Tennessee. They settled at first in Euless and then moved to Bedford in 1870. He farmed land there until moving to what is now Hurst in the late 1890s.

In 1903, the Rock Island Railroad wanted to build a rail line across his land, and he gave them a right of way. In exchange, the railroad built a train depot, naming it Hurst Station.

Although many believe that's

when the community was first named Hurst, George Green, a professor and historian who wrote *Hurst-Euless-Bedford, Heart of the Metroplex*, said it didn't take the name Hurst until six years later. A town 100 miles to the south in Coryell County was named Hurst until 1909, when it lost its post office.

Green said Saturday that Hurst

was the town's favorite entertainer. He played the fiddle at social events. Before one event, he told the residents he'd play "even if I they have to bring me in a coffin." Hurst died in his sleep the night before, Green said.

Hurst was buried in Bedford Cemetery, rather than Arwine Cemetery in Hurst. Bill Souder said Hurst was a Southern Democrat, while in-law T. Jefferson Souder was from Indiana and a Republican. Souder was buried in the Hurst cemetery.

"He never liked Souder and even though his daughter married a Souder, he said, 'I don't want to be buried with all them Yankees.'"

In 1910, Hurst's population was about 20 within its business district and 200 including the farming community. Today, Hurst has about 36,000 residents.

Even though it welcomes growth, Lana Davis, 55, great-granddaughter of Hurst, said the city's rich heritage makes it special. Many of the founding families' descendants still live in the community.

"Hurst is progressive, but it's still a small town where everybody knows everybody," she said.
